G Attention check 1

[This attention check question is asked right before the vignette. One question is randomly chosen from a pool of different questions that follow similar formats. Three examples are presented below. In the first example, the letter “X” is randomly selected from a list of months (June, December, May, and so on) or weekdays (Monday, Wednesday, and so on). In the second example, “X” is replaced by a two-digits number, such as 82 or 21. Respondents need to both select the correct answer and enter the correct word or number to pass the attention check.

If participants pass the attention check, they continue on to the vignette. If they fail the check, participants are given a new attention check question from the pool. If they fail this second check, they are dropped from the survey.]

- Abortion rights
 - Liberal positions:
 1. I advocate for people’s right to make their own decisions about abortion.
