Borderline Personality Disorder and Suicidality

- BPD carries a significant risk of suicide estimates have varied from between 3-10%
- Suicidal ideation (thinking and fantasizing about suicide) is pervasive in the borderline population
 - The rate of suicide is particularly high in the young female patient population
- Motivations for self-injurious behaviors are complex and vary among patients and between contexts
 - About 40% of self-harming acts done by borderline patients occur during dissociative experiences, when numbness and emptiness are at their worst.
 - For such patients, self-injury is often the only way to relive the distressing experience of not having "any feelings at all"
 - Some patients report causing themselves physical pain generates relief, briefly stopping agonising psychological pain.
 - Sometimes people with BPD make suicide attempts when they feel alone, abandoned and unloved, or when life feels so painful as to feel unbearable.
 - There may be a vaguely conceived plan to be rescued, which represents an attempt to relieve the feelings of aloneness by generating some connection with others
- Patients' attitudes towards suicide acts after the attempt are generally ambivalent (i.e. if rescued I want to live, if not, I prefer to die)
- The average number of suicide attempts is 3
 - Suicide is completed on average once per 23 attempts
- Outpatient therapy and treatment significantly reduce the risk of suicide and self-harm, but may not eliminate it completely.
