## Appendix B. Coding Decisions.

#### Content

Codes for content were developed inductively based on the cases and included economic, political, military, political and economic, political and military, demographic, public opinion, science, social, culture, religion, and multiple topics. These codes were collapsed into six dummy variables: economic or business-related, political, military, other (including demographic, public opinion, science, social, normative), and mixed or unspecified.

Eighteen regions or types of countries were identified in the initial coding, and these were reduced to nine codes: Europe and North America, Latin America/Caribbean, Africa and "Undeveloped" countries, Asia, Communist countries (USSR and the Soviet Bloc), the Middle East, Southeast Asia, Other (the Arctic and Antarctic, Space, Ocean, Australia/Oceania, the "non-west"), and None. I also coded each case for the types of actors involved in the topic (e.g. the USSR or "the West") but these variables did not improve the fit of the model so they were excluded from the reported models.

These six content codes and nine region codes were further reduced to the four dummy variables discussed above. I attempted to code for the breadth of a topic, as staff discuss in their memos, but inter-coder reliability on this measure was very low, so I did not include this variable.

## Proposal Length

I used a dummy variable for proposal length because of the difficulty in comparing exact length across the multiple forms of proposals in the archives. I look at whether a proposal is over one page, compared to proposals that were less than a page or those that included only a topic title without further explanation.

## **CFR** Affiliation

All proposals from individual staff members were coded as from CFR staff. When information on a proposer's CFR affiliation was not available from the CFR archives, I used the online database "Who's Who" and other resources, including newspaper obituaries and publically available curricula vitae, to fill in the information. I used CFR lists of members published in their yearly reports to verify membership.

## Recommendations

I first developed a code for whether a proposer received a recommendation. Of these cases, I coded strength of recommendations based on the content as strong, neutral, or mixed. I combined neutral and mixed recommendations so each case was recorded as having either strong recommendations, neutral/mixed recommendations, or no recommendations.

When recommendations were directly from CFR staff, directors, or from prominent people close to the CFR staff, I created a binary variable to indicate a recommendation from a close associate. This binary variable was coded as present if a recommendation came from a member of the CFR staff, a member of the Board of Directors of the CFR (for example, Philip Mosely Director of Studies; George S. Franklin, Executive Director of the CFR; Henry Wriston, member of the Board of

Directors; John McCloy, member of the Board of Directors), or from prominent CFR members, many of whom had participated in CFR research programs at some point, who appeared repeatedly in the archives as a source of recommendations (e.g. Henry Kissinger; Professor Raymond Vernon of Harvard Business School and Kennedy School of Government; August Maffry, an economist and international banker; or C. Fred Bergsten, an economist and senior fellow at the CFR who later served as assistant to Kissinger at the National Security Council and who worked in the U.S. Treasury Department under Carter). The list of prominent individuals with close ties to CFR staff included in this code was derived inductively from the records in the archive.

## New York Times Citations

In order to assess whether topics that received more media attention were more likely to be selected for study or discussion groups, I generated a list of keywords associated with each proposed topic, as well as key phrases (combinations of keywords). A research assistant then searched the archives of the *New York Times* for the number of times those keywords or key phrases occurred in the three years prior to when the topic was proposed, to the month. The search erred on the side of overinclusion. If no results were returned, the research assistant searched for results based on a smaller set of the search terms. The overriding principle was consistency in the use of search terms so that, even if the scale was incorrect, the relative numbers of citations by proposed topic was meaningful.
