2. NOTES ON SOFTWARE AND COMPUTATION

The software for administering our CAT algorithm consisted of two major components: a survey application and an item selection application. These were developed independently so that the process of computerized adaptive item selection could be decoupled from the specific survey delivery mechanism and used more widely in the future by researchers engaged in surveys of any mode.

The item select application (ISA) is an R package that can be used by researchers on nearly any platform to efficiently select items given item parameters and prior individual responses. This package, along with documentation and vignettes designed around the simulations in this paper, will be included in the replication archives for this paper at the time of publication.

The ISA provides a simple interface through which researchers can input item-level parameters and individuals' responses and quickly receive information about which item is associated with the minimum posterior variance. This code should enable researchers to set up their own protocols for implementing CAT algorithms for item selections during in-person or phone interviews. Since this code is open source and available to the public, it will also facilitate implementation of the technique by survey firms for all modes, including web-based surveys.¹

For this paper, the ISA was hosted on an online server using the Rook library in R using a cloud-based web-server.² The required code as well as instructions for duplicating our procedure will also be available in our replication files. While some additional expertise on interfacing with web APIs is necessary for following this procedure, these files and documentation should significantly reduce the required investment for implementing CAT on any survey platform.

Finally, we are in the process of developing infrastructure to enable future researchers to use a survey design tool of their choice (e.g., Qualtrics) and integrate it with our ISA at a limited cost and with only a limited amount of technical expertise. The aim of this software development is to make CAT algorithms accessible and extendable to researchers with a wide array of technical skills.

¹While R libraries exist to perform many of the calculations necessary for doing item selection, we found that they gave us erratic results that were difficult to explain. In addition, they were not well suited to being run in a multicore (or multi-machine) environment. We wrote our own CAT library that is both optimized for multicore machines and provides consistently correct results.
