Appendix - Qualitative interview methodology

This paper is based on prior field research on three police institutions in Latin America conducted for the author's dissertation, which focused on the emergence of police reform and participatory security institutions in Argentina, Brazil, and Colombia. Initial fieldwork for this paper was conducted by the author in São Paulo, Brazil; Bogotá, Colombia; and Buenos Aires, Argentina over a period of 16 months in 2010, 2011, and 2012. Two additional months of field research was conducted by the author in 2017 (one month) and 2019 (one month).

The paper is based on semi-structured interviews with 80 police officials of various ranks, as well as civil society advocates in São Paulo, Brazil and Bogotá, Colombia. Police officials were selected for interviews based on their current or former positions in police leadership and in particular in positions relating to particular reforms (such as community policing). Additional interviews with police officials were conducted based on snowball sampling, in which previous interviewees suggested additional officials that could further speak to particular areas of policing or specific reforms. Civil society advocates were selected for interviews based on their work in organizations that specifically deal with policing, security, and/or police violence.
