




2 Do you identify yourself as coming from a working class background?




Do you speak any modern language other than your own native one, or are you currently learning one or more foreign languages? (excluding Greek and Latin)




Do you feel your educational background had a negative impact on how you feel about foreign or ancient languages (only one option possible: choose that one that best represents you)





Do you feel your ability to learn or general attittude to foreign languages would have been different if you belonged to a higher social class?




Do you feel your ability to learn or general attitude towards foreign languages would have been different if you lived in a different part of the UK, for example in the South East of England?






Would you say, based on your own experience at Liverpool and beyond, that Classics is an elitist subject?







15 Why did you decide not to take up Latin or Greek? [choose all that applies to you]










19 Are you aware that no prior knowledge of Greek and Latin is required to attend language modules?




Multi answer: Percentage of respondents who selected each answer option (e.g. 100% would represent that all this question's respondents chose that option)
